High School Promotion & Graduation in NYC

Families should begin thinking about high school graduation requirements well before a student's fourth year of high school. If you have questions about whether you will be ready for graduation, talk to your guidance counselor.

PROMOTION FOR EACH GRADE

Grade 9: Earn a minimum of 8 credits

Grade 10: Have a minimum of 20 credits, including 4 in English/ESL and 4 in Social Studies

Grade II: Have a minimum of 30 credits

CREDITS FOR GRADUATION: 44 credits required

- 8 in English
- 8 in Social Studies (4 in Global History, 2 in American History, 1 in Economics, 1 in Government)
- 6 in Science (2 in Life Science, 2 in Physical Sciences, 2 additional in Life Science or Physical Science)
- 6 in Math
- 2 in Second Language
- 2 in Visual Art, Music, Dance, and/or Theater
- 5 in Health and Physical Education (4 in Physical Education, 1 in Health Education)
- 7 in Elective Areas

EXAMS FOR GRADUATION: 5 exams required

Four required Regents exams: English Language Arts, one Math, one History (U.S. History OR Global History), and one Science

- Scores of 65 are generally required.
- However, if you score a 60, 61, 62, 63, or 64 on one or two exams, you may be able to appeal the
 exam(s) and still graduate. See AFC's <u>Appeal Options for Regents Exams</u>.
- Students with disabilities and English Language Learners can graduate with lower Regents scores.

AND one State-approved exam of your choice, including:

- Additional Regents exams
- SAT II exams
- Advanced Placement (AP) exams
- International Baccalaureate (IB) exams
- Language Other Than English (LOTE) exam
- State-approved CTE exams
- Career Development and Occupational Studies (CDOS) Credential

CHANGES DURING COVID-19

If you planned to take a Regents exam from June 2020 to January 2022, you may be eligible for a COVID-19 exemption to the exam. To learn more, check out this <u>tip sheet</u>.*

If you pass a Regents course and take the Regents exam in that subject between June 2022 and August 2023, you can appeal scores of 50-64, instead of the usual 60-64, and still earn a Regents Diploma. You do not need to (I) take the exam twice, (2) take advantage of academic help at your school, or (3) get a recommendation to qualify.

*The U.S. History Regents exam was also cancelled in June 2022, though not due to COVID-19. If you were supposed to take that Regents exam, you are eligible for a Regents exemption.
